



## Inspection

The Government of Kenya periodically conducts inspections of children's homes without notice. Our CEO Jane Wasike reports that in a March inspection, the inspectors expressed how well the home was doing. All the documents were well maintained, and the house was in order and very clean. The Government left four requirements: (a) Life4Kids must now own a permanent home for the children. (b) Life4Kids must continue reintegrating the boys 18 years and above into their communities. (c) The bedding for the boys is to be replaced regularly (due to trauma, most young boys wet their beds every day. (d) A separate room is to be provided for sick children.

## Update on the Younger Boys

The younger boys are doing well both at home and in school. They all did well in their opening exams and in their midterm exams. The staff go to school meetings for all the boys to check on their academics.

We are all proud of them and all the credit goes to the staff for doing such a great job." The boys were home for a short mid-term break in March. 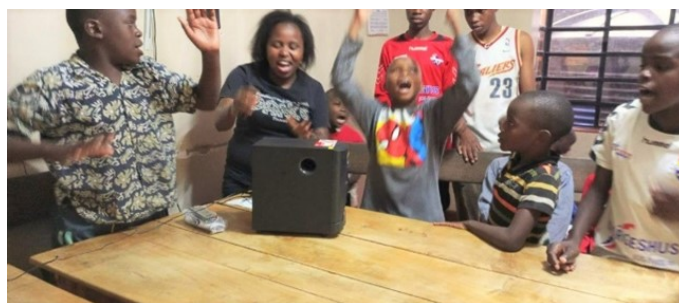


## Update on the Big Boys
