Update from Kenya:

We're delighted to report that all is going very well at the Life4Kids home in Nairobi. Schools have reopened and the boys are back in class. We now have nineteen boys under 18 and ten aged 18 and over.



We often speak about the little boys. But we thought you'd enjoy seeing some of the "grads" and older boys. From left to right above, Mike (who grew up in

Life4Kids and is now a Nairobi policeman), Dennis (who also grew up in Life4Kids and now is employed as a caregiver at the Life4Kids home), Job (who is our first university student), and Ian (who is now in high school).

New Boys:

Our goal is to have 25 little boys under the age of 18 (in addition to the boys 18 and over) in the care of Life4Kids. Four little boys have recently joined the family.



These two are the latest, pictured where they were found at the dump, scrounging for food. Life4Kids provides a loving home, food, education, health care, and most importantly, hope for the future for these little boys.

Sponsorship Program:



In our December edition of this "Journal", we introduced the concept of sponsorship. For \$40 a week (\$170 a month), we can provide for one of our boys, three wholesome and nutritional meals a day, clothing, medication, and toiletries, counselling and therapy, education (tuition and supplies), and a bed in which to sleep, safe and secure. We are delighted to report that we have been overwhelmed by the response. Fifteen (15) boys are now sponsored. Can we count on you?

Update from Kenya:

We're pleased to report that the Kenyan authorities have completed their health inspection of the new home, and they are pleased with the size of the home and the outdoor space for the boys to play.



We are planning to welcome two new boys into the home this month. That will bring our numbers to a total of 31 boys (21 under 18 and 10 aged 18 or older).

Sponsorship Program:

We are grateful for your support of the sponsorship program. All but one of the most recent new boys are now sponsored. But with two boys arriving in March,



there is an opportunity to fund meals, clothing, education, medication, and toiletries for one of our little boys for \$170 per month. In some cases, we have groups of 3 or 4

people sponsoring a boy. We'd love to discuss this with you. The picture above is of the three newest boys heading off for school.

COVID-19 in Kenya:



The pandemic has had a dramatic effect in Kenya. Schools in Nairobi were closed from March until January. But now, news has been released that

vaccines will be available beginning early in March.

The Pandemic in Nairobi:

The Government of Kenya has announced lockdowns in Nairobi and surrounding area. Social meetings, sports and political events have been banned, churches have been closed, and all transportation has been shut down so there is no movement by vehicle, air or rail.

Schools Closed in Nairobi:

Schools in Nairobi were closed last week so most of the Life4Kids boys are now at home, including the boys attending college, and boarding schools. One boy



is attending university in Western Kenya and remains there, but not in school. Having the boys being at home all the time places an added burden on the staff at the Life4Kids home in Nairobi. Imagine almost 20 young boys in your home 24/7. Keeping them engaged is critical.

New Boys:

We are pleased to advise that two new boys are joining the Life4Kids family. These street boys from the Dandora slums were referred to the Life4Kids home by the Chief of that slum. They are 5 years old and 4 years old.



Staff Member Dennis:

In our January edition of this "Journal", we introduced you to Dennis (with three others). Dennis was one of



the original boys living in the Life4Kids home. He is now a caregiver at the home. Since our January edition, Dennis was attacked on the streets of Nairobi and beaten. We are pleased to report that he has recovered from the beating and is doing well and fully back on duty at the home.

Meet Andrew Markle:

Andy volunteers with Life4Kids Canada as a director and treasurer. He enjoys being a "part time" assistant for his daughter who manages a family business. For more than fifty years, he has volunteered with many community organizations including the Midland YMCA, Community Living Huronia, the Midland Cultural Centre, and the Canadian and Alberta 7th Step Societies, organizations supporting offenders and ex-offenders as they prepare and make new starts in society after incarceration.



COVID-19 In Kenya

Our Executive Director, Jane Wasike, reports that the children are doing well. None of the staff or children have had COVID-19. All are healthy. The President of Kenya has again locked down all movements in and out of four counties surrounding Nairobi.

Schools in Nairobi

Jane reports: "All the young boys and our high school boys schools closed last week. They are all at home with us!! We have made a schedule that will run for a full week for the whole period while boys at home." The staff are now working in two shifts. Each shift works twenty-four hours a day for four days and then four days off.



New Boys

The staff went into the Dandora slums and brought home two young street boys who were referred by the Chief of that slum. They are five years old and three years old.

New Boys

Three more little boys joined the Life4Kids family in the past few days. They have had incredibly sad lives until now. Because they have been living on the street, socialization is a challenge and the Life4Kids staff members are working extremely hard to prepare them for school in August.



Schooling Update

After being closed for COVID-19, schools have reopened. Most of the boys are back in school. Five of the newest boys will not start school until August. Two boys will start high school next year and four more will be in high school in two years. Another boy has finished high school and will attend college in August. We now have twenty-four young boys in the house and eleven big boys in school. As the boys progress with their education, costs mount.

Sponsorships

There are now twenty-four little boys living in the main home and ten big boys off attending school.


The Boys Have Chores

\$10 a Week

Costs are Rising

We recently received this message from Executive Director Jane Wasike: “Life in Kenya is very expensive right now as compared to the last few months. Last week the President signed a financial bill that has put more financial burdens on the common citizens. The prices for commodities have gone so high, life has become so expensive. For example, cooking gas was at 2,200, now is at 2,700 kshs [Kenyan Shillings]; Cooking oil 20 litres is at 4,900 kshs from 3,300 kshs. This will cause our budget to go so high....”



Other News from Nairobi

Jane reports: “We are all doing well. The children ... returned to school for the first term. The new boys [the three recent additions] have been trained and prepared enough, they are now ready to go to school. We have budgeted for their schooling in the August budget.”




Family Portrait

The Coronavirus Pandemic in Kenya

Confirmed cases of COVID-19 are spiralling upwards in Kenya. The number of deaths per day is now the highest since the onset of the pandemic. Only 2.1 million of the population of over 40 million have received even one vaccination shot. Fortunately, the boys at Life4Kids are well.



The Life4Kids Staff

Have you ever stopped to think what it would be like to raise a family of twenty-five? That is the task that our staff in Nairobi face every day of every week of every month of every year. And what a marvellous job they do. There are challenges. These are active little boys. They grew up on the streets. Life4Kids Canada pays tribute to the staff. We thank them and encourage them in all they do!



The Economy in Kenya

Kenya actually has the third largest economy in Sub-Saharan Africa (behind Nigeria and South Africa). However, the country faces many

challenges including judicial ineffectiveness, poor government integrity, drought, lack of security, corruption, and political squabbling. Education is key for the nation as a whole and for our Life4Kids boys.



The Challenges

There are a couple of current challenges being faced by the staff and by our Executive Director in Kenya, Jane.

A. Security: One involves the physical security of the home. A gang has broken down the perimeter wall at the home leaving it exposed to petty criminals. A night guard has been hired. Pray for the safety of the boys, the staff, and the home.

B. Education: Some of the boys are struggling in school. Some of the big boys are not applying themselves to the studies as well as they are capable of doing. As noted earlier, education is critical to any success in life the boys might hope to achieve.



Update on the Little Boys

Our CEO, Jane, reports that all the boys and staff are doing well. All the boys are home for a school break from October 1st to 10th.

Update on Schooling

Fifteen of the boys are doing the Kenyan competency-based curriculum. This government mandated curriculum is more challenging and more expensive but is viewed as best for the Kenyan children.

Three of the big boys (18 and over) are now in college or university. One boy just started college and is coping very well with his new friends and new surroundings.

Question You Have Asked

In this edition of the Life4Kids Journal, we're going to try to provide some responses to questions we have been asked.

Where do the Boys Come From?



The boys in Life4Kids are all orphans or abandoned boys. Most have been homeless, begging for food in the streets or living at dumps and eating from the refuse. The boys are referred to Life4Kids by the police, by government authorities, by tribal chiefs and even, sometimes, by older boys living on the street

who fear for the safety of the little ones. *[The little boy in the accompanying picture asked to go back to visit his grandmother at the dump].*

What Qualifications do the Staff Have?

Our CEO, Jane Wasike has a university degree in social work. Five of the caregivers are qualified social workers and all are trained caregivers through government training. Their primary qualification is love!



What is the Staff to Child Ratio?

We have 25 boys under the age of 18 living in the home. They are attended by 10 staff including our CEO, a cook, 6 caregivers, a security guard, a part time bookkeeper and part time trauma therapist. We also support 10 boys 18 or older who live at their schools. We provide an apartment for school breaks.

Where does the Money Go?

All funds donated to Life4Kids are accounted for in financial statements prepared by our accountants in a Review Engagement Report. All funds are sent to



Life4Kids Kenya, a charity. The Kenya home provides a monthly budget and reports on how all funds are expended. The only funds spent in Canada are for accounting services, bank fees, insurance, and minor office expenses. We are all volunteers in Life4Kids Canada, including our bookkeeper.

Does Life4Kids Canada Have Any Input in the Operation of the Home?

Two of our Canadian Directors serve on the Advisory Board. They advise the Board in Kenya and meet monthly with the CEO and Kenyan Board. One of our Directors and several Canadian supporters have visited the home in Nairobi, Kenya.



What Schools do the Boys Attend?



One boy is in second year university. Two are in first year college. One is waiting to start college. Eight are in high school (two on scholarship). The nine youngest (ages 4-7) are in private school. Thirteen junior boys (ages 7-14) are in a government operated primary school.



Questions You Have Asked

As we did in last month's Journal, we'll again provide responses to questions asked...

How Is Health Care Provided?

Kenya does not have a public health care system similar to Canada. While care is provided for the



poor, it is not of the same quality as private care. We provide health insurance for our boys for private care.

How are Birthdays Celebrated?

You may recall this picture of the group Birthday Party in our October edition of the Journal - The actual dates of birth of the boys are unknown. So, they all are registered with a date of birth of January 1 in the



year of their birth. And Life4Kids celebrates all their birthdays on the same day (although the actual date varies).

Do the Boys Receive Christmas Gifts?

Life4Kids tries to provide small gifts for each of the thirty-five boys at Christmas. This year two of our Canadian supporters provided additional funds for gifts for the big boys.



Recently, supporters from Norway visited the home and shared gifts with the boys.

Are there Sponsorships for Big Boys?

We are delighted to advise that all the boys under 18 now have Canadian sponsors. But we do not have sponsors to help offset the cost of education for our



10 boys aged 18 or older. The cost to sponsor a "big boy" is \$3,000 per year. If you (or you and friends) are able to sponsor one boy, please let us know immediately.

Appeal for Support at Christmas

We in Canada have no idea what horrors these boys have faced in their tragic past or what challenges the future may hold for them. But we do know that they are now safe, well fed, happy and loved. Each year at this Christmas season, many of you provide special financial gifts to help sustain Life4Kids in Kenya.
